


Geography – Farming

There are two main types of farms you will notice in the local area. Some farms have livestock like cows and sheep. Other farms grow crops like strawberries, potatoes or apples.

Imagine you were a farmer.....would you have livestock or crops? Draw a picture of your farm from above, it could look something like this:



Label the different parts of the farm and equipment you would need e.g. fields, barns, tractors, hay, water troughs, animals, crops.

What would your farm sell? If your farm has animals would they be used for meat, milk or eggs? If your farm has crops, which crops would you sell?

Science – Growing

You will need to use the equipment in your home packs (compost, pot, sunflower seeds) for this activity. You are going to be observing how seeds grow.

See if you can become a real life scientist and do your own growing experiment.....

Seed 1

Plant a seed in a pot (it can be planted in a plastic food tray if you don't have a pot). Leave this seed in the dark in a cupboard and observe what happens. Make sure you still water it each day.

Seed 2

Plant another seed in a pot. Place this seed on a windowsill where it can get plenty of sunlight. Remember to water it each day.

Record your observations on the template:

Things I Will Change	Things I Will Keep the Same
type of plant	where the plant is placed
time you leave the plant	how much water the plant has

Draw a picture of what both plants look like after one week.
